A: You seem to have confused the order of parameters to find: -ls tells find to list the contents of the specified directory (and subdirectories) in the format described in find(1). That is -ls is meant to be used in conjunction with find -exec { } \; where { } represents the content of the current directory and the \; at the end tells find to execute the command after the filename, but before the command substitution. By reading the man page of find you will see that the parameter -iname can also be used with -exec. The difference is that -iname is a filter for the current directory, whereas -exec is a filter for all the files. The -type is the content of the file, not the path and file name, and you should have -type f instead of -type f*. The full command is then find. -iname "*redis*" -type f -ls - 82157476af

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
